Using Crystals for Abundance

Abundance is the connection to the source of all that is; manifesting a constant flow to support, nourish and expand life as well as creativity. In Chinese Feng Shui the wealth corner is the corner farthest away and to the far left of the front door or the southeast corner, depending on what system you use. If you like to use this system you can set up crystals to attract various forms of abundance there.

Some crystals that are associated with abundance are usually green, yellow, gold or orange. However there are other stones that do not have those colors and work just as well. Yellow Sapphire is associated with Ganesh, Hindu god of prosperity. This stone attracts wealth to the home. An Abundance Crystal is a Quartz crystal with one long part and many tiny crystals at the base to encourage dreams, well-being, and love. Tiger's Eye helps people with material things and assists by showing the best way to do something. It stimulates wealth and helps create stability to maintain wealth. Citrine should be placed in your wealth corner to attract abundance. Carnelian improves motivation and getting out of a rut. Peridot brings wealth quickly and is best for someone who already has things under control. Topaz helps you appreciate life and makes room for abundance. It taps into your own natural resources and because its facets carry both negative as well as positive charges, it helps manifest desires.

When you decide on a crystal to use cleanse it first by running it under water, charging it in the sun or moon, putting it in a pyramid, or if you are a Reiki practitioner, simply Reiki your crystal. Some people put their crystals in sea salt. This is a great way to cleanse them, just make sure the crystal that you are working with will not be damaged by the salt. Always throw away your salt when you are done.

You can program your crystal to attract a specific form of abundance by holding it in your hands and picturing what you want to manifest in your life. Make sure you keep your area for your crystal clean and charged. Periodically smudging the area will help you with this. In your abundance area you may wish to include something that represents Deity to you and perhaps the type of abundance you want to bring into your life. Being as specific as possible helps to create the energy you wish to attract. As your wealth increases in material, spiritual, and emotional areas be sure to give thanks for what has manifested in your life.

Lizard Brain

I love lizards, and they love my garden. I find them beautiful, fascinating and amusing, and they find my garden a safe place to live. In return, they teach me about life.

Not too long ago, I was busy watering when I noticed a small black lizard peering at me from under my small stand of fennel. When I spoke to it, it angled sideways and began doing 'pushups' with its front legs to show me how big and scary it was. Then we both noticed another, larger lizard come out from under my comfrey, which lives next door to the fennel stand. Immediately the black lizard rushed over

and began climbing all over it and doing pushups, basically trying to make the larger lizard go away. "Mine, mine, mine, this is all MINE!" it seemed to be saying.

At first the larger lizard ignored the antics. Then it either got annoyed or just tired of all the fuss, so it headed into the fennel, behind the grape hyacinths. The black lizard followed it, still carrying on. Quite a bit of rustling and shaking went on in the leaves of the grape hyacinths, which had stopped blooming but still showed their green foliage. After a minute or two, the larger lizard ran out of the fennel and back into the comfrey. The black lizard emerged triumphant, and then immediately began posturing and doing pushups at me again.

Standing across the garden, I looked around at all the plots spread out around mine. The garden is so big; there is more than enough space in it for all the creatures that live there. Yet the black lizard could only see a small part of it, and was convinced that it needed all it could see.

How many times do WE see only the smaller picture? How often are we convinced that there isn't enough for everyone, and that we are entitled to ALL we can see?

"Goddess, help me to see the bigger picture,

And that we are all in this together.

Help me to see the boundaries around my space

So that I don't infringe on someone else's."

Goddess Sites of India

This time I thought I would focus on three sites offering three different aspects of Goddess. The first is a Temple devoted to the sacred Yoni, the second site honours the Goddess Kali, and the third site is the home of the Living Goddess Amma.

The Kamakhya Temple is considered one of the most sacred sites in India. It rests upon Nilachal Hill in the city of Guwahati in the state of Assam in Northeastern India.

Legends tell us that Sati (Sakti) immolated herself with her Yoni fire when her father disrespected her and her husband (the god Shiva) at a family gathering. The distraught Shiva carried her corpse on his back and travelled through India. In those places where parts of Sati's body landed, a temple was erected. Kamakhya is said to be the place where her Yoni fell and has since become a site of Yoni worship.

The Yoni is a sacred symbol; it is the transition point for subtle forces, the gateway to life and the cosmic mysteries. Many statues depict the Great Mother standing with legs apart; Her devotees drink the yoni-tattva, the sublime essence, from Her vulva.

There are no images of the Goddess anywhere in the Temple; however, deep within the depths, there is a yoni-shaped cleft in the rock known as the Yoni of Sakti. A natural spring within the stones, keeps the cleft moist. Worshippers place their hands within the cleft to be blessed by the sacred waters within.

From mid-July to mid-August, the waters within the stones flow red (due to iron oxide) and are considered to be the menstrual blood of Mother Earth. There is a celebration known as the Ambuvaci or Ameti fertility festival. This is a time of great ceremony and women on their moon flow are especially venerated at this time.

Menstrual blood may be taken as a sacred drink with wine; women's yonis are kissed and anointed with sandalwood paste by devotees.

The second site is the Kalighat Temple in Calcutta, West Bengal, also in the Northeast. Legends state that four toes of the right foot of Sakti fell to Earth here beside the Ganges River and so a Temple was built. This is the home of Kali as the Death Crone, the Goddess of Death and Regeneration. It is no surprise that the Kalighat Home for the Dying, founded by Mother Theresa, is situated nearby. Kali is also depicted as the Saviour, Cosmic Mother, Sovereign and Divine Power controlling the Universe. Mother Kalika punishes wrong-doers but is also very forgiving and assists them through their misery. As a feminine Saviour, She takes on a role similar to that of Isis, Artemis or Hekate. She forgives, preserves and bestows grace on Her followers. Devotees also pray to Kali to be liberated from the shackles of political oppression.

The temple consists of two sections, the main floor which houses a statue of Kali at the centre, and an upper balcony that runs around the building, allowing worshipers to view the statue from all sides. Kalighat is home to a most unusual and iconic statue of Kali, a figure of deepest black stone with three eyes painted brightest red, the third eye is on its side making the whole figure almost inhuman. The face was created first and over the years, hands, feet and a long, protruding tongue, all of gold and silver, were added. Worshipers often come to touch the feet of the statue of Kali to receive the blessing of Sakti.

The statue of Kali is worshipped as a living embodiment of the Goddess. Once a year, during the festival of 'Snan Yatra' (Bathing Ceremony), priests cover their eyes with strips of cloth and carry the statue to the Ganges to be bathed. She is dressed in new robes and returned to Her Temple.

The third site, Amritapuri Ashram, is located in Kollam, Kerala state in the Southern tip of India. This site is home to Sri Mata Amritanandamayi Devi, affectionately known to the world simply as Amma. Built upon the very property where Amma was born, Amritapuri is now the headquarters of Amma's worldwide mission and the spiritual home of thousands of devotees. Amma's monastic disciples and householder devotees stay here, dedicating their lives to realising God and serving the world. Every day, Amma's children from across India and around the world flock here to receive Amma's darshan. She sees each and every one, consoling them,

encouraging them, and giving new direction to their lives. When Amma is not giving darshan, She is leading the ashramites in meditation, instructing them in their spiritual practices and edifying them with Her immortal wisdom. There are classes in yoga, Sanskrit, Vedanta and meditation.

Amritapuri is the realisation of the ancient Indian ideal "the whole world is one family". Here you will find people from all over the world — speaking different languages and having different customs and religions, all living under one roof. In their quest for the meaning of life, each has forgotten their differences and become a child of Amma.

Amma is known as a living Goddess, She is The Divine Mother of Unconditional and Ever-Embracing Love. Born in 1953, She came into the world smiling and aware. Her childhood was spent in meditation and singing to Lord Krishna. Her Ministry began at the age of nine when She left school to care for Her sick mother. She became aware of the suffering of others and Her heart poured out to those in need.

Amma's teachings are universal and could be called the Path of Love. Love radiates from Her very be-ing and Her eyes are always smiling. She speaks no English and rarely gives talks. She communicates through Her eyes, twinkling, smiling, present for every devotee. During darshan, She may give as many as 18,000 hugs in a sitting, the last as love-filled as the first. Her choice to not communicate verbally through lectures, forces us Westerners to come to Her on Her level, from the heart. She is the Mother and we Children of the Earth are Her Children.

Amma's belief is that the Divine exists in all living things and She asks devotees only that they learn their true nature and believe in themselves. I feel this is very similar to our own OWM teachings. Amma's path is a path of Service, to the community, to those in need. Donations of money and time assist millions of people around the world. Amma's foundation has built homes for the poor, women's shelters, schools and orphanages, hospitals and hospices. Amma disburses pensions to over 50,000 widows who would be left penniless beggars without Her help. She truly is the living embodiment of Goddess in Her aspect of Divine and Nurturing Mother.

We Are HP's

The White Moon School was founded in May of 1999, and the Order of the White Moon was incorporated as a non-profit 501 c 3 religious corporation in 2003. All this time, we, the Order's legally ordained ministers, going by the title of High Priestess, have not used the acronym "HPS" for our title, as is common in many Wiccan trads. Rather, we use the title "HP", and several sisters have asked why we have adopted that usage.

In the "Gardnerian-trad" Wiccan/Pagan world, there are lots of covens and Wiccan and pagan groups where they have both female and male clergy. It is in these groups, in which both women and men and can be ordained, that "HP" is often used for High Priest, and that "HPS" is often used for High Priestess.

However, here in the OWM, we who are the Order's clergy follow the strong foundation established by our founder, Luna Blanca, the author of our White Moon teachings. Luna insisted that we were created as a ministry TO women BY women, and that we call ourselves HP's, because our clergy in OWM are ALL WOMEN.

Hence, within our Order, we have no need to distinguish between male HP's and female HPS's.

We, your HP's, have followed this practice since our first HP was ordained, in November of 2000.

As we are an all-female clergy, many have also asked us whether we, as an Order, are "Dianic", the term created to reflect the merger of feminist thought and Goddess thealogy created in the late 1970's by the extraordinary Zsusanna Budapest and her co-coveners in Santa Monica, CA and NY, NY.

As an Order, we do not categorize ourselves as "Dianic" because we pride ourselves upon being thealogically "eclectic".

We all share a body of living knowledge (the lessons created by Luna Blanca which we offer to OWM students as Level I - Level III, with 16 lessons, a special project and an Initiation at the conclusion of each Level), but do not dictate or mandate any sort of exclusive, limited doctrinal thealogy or ritual practice for our members.

Some of us ARE Dianic, working, loving and walking our Path only with Goddess, but others amongst us DO have male deity altars as part of our private ritual practice. We follow the teachings of our founder and firmly believe that exploring the Feminine side of Deity is of value to ANY faith path.

You might also be interested to know that we do teach men.....transgendered and regular (*grin*).... but, in separate Orders affiliated with OWM; were any of the students of these Orders to get out of Level I (and none have yet done so), or get to a point where Ordination was an issue, they would be ordained under the authority of OWM, but in the name of the affiliated Order.

Your Board of Directors is determined that we will remain an all-female clergy within the OWM, and thus retain our title as HP's.

HP Kerritwyn

HP Kerritwyn was raised Irish Catholic but searched for years for a faith path in which she could feel at home. She found Celtic Wicca in September of 1997, joined a local coven for a year, and, in June of 1999, joined the White Moon School, which had just been started by Luna Blanca.

Kerritwyn was ordained as an HP in the Order in December of 2000, and offers OWM teachings to women in <u>The Sacred Three Goddess School</u>, and to male-to-female transgendered seekers in the Order of the Rainbow Moon.

In mundane life, Kerritwyn is a practicing attorney, and she is married to a transgendered partner. She is a member of the OWM's Board of Directors and the Vice President of Ordinations.

Scrying Mirror

This is a simple and inexpensive project that the entire family can participate in. Children are natural scryers and this is a wonderful opportunity to create their very own Magick Mirror. This is also a great way for adults to connect with their inner child in a creative and intuitive manner.

How to create a magickal scrying mirror

Items needed
oval picture frame (available at most dollar stores)
equal parts vinegar and water solution to clean the glass
newspapers
high-gloss black paint
paint brush

turpentine and rags to clean brushes

Optional

You may want to decorate the frame in a way that is meaningful to you. Use a glue gun to add stones, beads, feathers to the frame or you can paint magickal symbols on it.

During the New Moon, gather your supplies either outside or in a well-ventilated area. Cast your circle and call on Goddesses of Divination to guide you. Hathor, Oshun, Isis, Aine and Asherah are all wonderful Goddesses to call on. Parents should supervise children during this part of the project.

Spread newspapers around your work area

Remove the glass from the frame

Clean the glass with the vinegar/water solution and dry with newspaper

Place it in the centre of the newspapers

Clear your mind and pick up the black paint

Paint one side of the glass from top to bottom in even strokes

As you paint, visualize, whisper or say aloud your intent for this magickal tool

Only paint one side of the glass

Allow to dry completely before applying the next coat (drying times may vary)

Apply several coats of paint, ensuring the entire surface of the glass is coated (one side only)

When the paint has dried completely, return the glass to the frame

Ensure the glass side is facing out

Charge your mirror during the Full Moon and begin scrying.

How to use your scrying mirror

In a darkened room, light one small candle and place behind the mirror. Hold the mirror in your hands or use a stand. Meditate on a question or chant softly until your mind is focussed. Call upon Goddesses of Divination to assist you.

Cast doubt from your mind, expect to see images and it will happen.

Gaze into the blackness of the mirror rather than focussing on the glass surface.

Do not blink the eyes more than is necessary. Too much blinking breaks concentration, staring too hard can cause eye strain.

Do not let your gaze wander from the mirror. If you are experiencing some difficulty, try to visualize the blackness as infinite space and project your gaze several feet into the blackness.

It may take some practice to achieve results but it is worth the effort. Limit your scrying time to 15 minutes until you get results. Scrying is a valuable tool to connect with the inner workings of the sub-conscious.

Lammas Bread
Laiiiiias Di Cau
Ingredients:
2 cups warm milk
2 packages dry yeast
1 tsp salt
1/2 cup honey
1/4 cup brown sugar
Mix together in a large bowl, cover and set in a warm place until doubled (about 30 minutes).
Add the following:
3 Tbsp. softened butter
2 cups unbleached white flour
Stir until bubbly.
Mix in the following:

1 cup rye flour 2 cups whole wheat flour With floured hands, turn the dough onto a floured surface and gradually knead in more white flour until the dough is smooth and elastic. Place the dough in a large greased bowl, turning once so that the dough is greased, cover with a cloth and set in a warm place until it doubles in size (about 1 hour). Punch the dough down and divide in two. Shape into balls, flattened at the top and place on a cookie sheet. Cover and set in a warm place until doubled. (about 1 hour) When the final rising is almost complete, use your athame and carve a pentagram in the centre of the loaf as you recite a blessing of thanks to the Grain Goddess. For variety, once the bread has been separated in two, shape the dough into figures symbolizing the God and Goddess of the Grain. Cover and allow to rise until doubled. Beat together: 1 egg 1 tbsp. water Brush the loaves and bake in a preheated oven at 300 degrees for 1 hour.

Share this blessing of the Goddess during your Lammas Feast.

Chocolate Leaves

Ingredients:
1 bag semi-sweet chocolate chips
1 bag white chocolate chips
2 tsp butter
assorted broad-leafed herbs (mint, basil, celery etc)
Select your sprigs of leaves in the produce section of your grocery store or from your garden. Ensure they are free of pesticides. Wash leaves thoroughly and pat dry.
Melt chocolate and butter, stirring with a wooden ladle until smooth.
Pour chocolate mixture into a bowl.
Use a new, small paint brush to coat the underside of the leaves with the chocolate and place on a wax paper covered cookie sheet.
Refrigerate until firm.
Refrigerate until firm. Slowly pull real leaves away from chocolate leaves.

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
